Frederick County Fights COVID-19

2021 saw significant progress in the fight against COVID-19 with our community stepping up in a variety of ways.

As our global community experienced another year of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, Frederick Health continued to impact our community for the better. With the life-saving COVID-19 vaccine becoming more readily available, Frederick Health and our community partnersincluding the Frederick County Health Department, the Asian American Center of Frederick (AACF), Frederick County Housing and Human Services, The Love for Lochlin Foundation, and the Spanish Speaking Community of Maryland Incworked to improve access for as many Frederick County residents as possible.

These efforts included several successful initiatives, but were capped by the extremely popular Mobile Vaccine Clinic. The Mobile Clinic made its debut in September 2021

Protecting Frederick: COVID-19 Vaccine Clinics

Since vaccines first became available to the public, Frederick Health staff and volunteers have worked hard to distribute them.

One of those volunteers includes Dr. Carmen Hernandez, a recently retired gastroenterologist who worked at Frederick Health for more than 34 years.

Dr. Hernandez retired a few months after the pandemic began, but knew her help was still needed during this extremely difficult time for healthcare workers and the community. She offered her support, starting with assisting the Auxiliary in making personal protective equipment (PPE), like gowns, masks, and visors. As vaccines became available, Dr. Hernandez's experience made her qualified to administer them, so she transferred to helping out in the clinic.

"Each week, the processes improved, and we were able to give more vaccines to more people," said Dr. Hernandez. "The team who organized the clinic did an incredible job helping patients to safely register and get their shot."

The clinic was originally located at Frederick Health Crestwood and served patients 65 and older. As eligibility expanded, the clinic was moved to its larger location at Frederick Health Village to accommodate the significant demand and to continue following social distancing quidelines.

Staff and volunteers did everything possible to ensure that not a single vaccine went to waste. If a patient missed an appointment, the team was quick to fill the vacancy and offered extras to anyone who wanted one, regardless of eligibility.

"If we couldn't find someone, we were going to go out to the street and start asking people," added Dr. Hernandez. "There was a day where I called people from my church who had been eagerly waiting for a vaccine."

To date, Frederick Health Frederick Health has vaccinated nearly 90,000 people, thanks to passionate staff and volunteers like Dr. Hernandez who were willing to give their time and effort.

"Frederick Health made a huge impact on the health of the community. They are primarily concerned about their patients and making sure they have access to the preventative care they need. They were able to reach tens of thousands of patients quickly and efficiently."

Keeping Frederick **Families Healthy**

Healthy eating is an important part of your well-being.

It can lower your risk of disease, support your immune system, strengthen bones and muscles, and more. However, not everyone has access to the healthy foods required to be well and stay well.

Frederick Health makes it easy to access healthy, affordable food by working with LiveWell Frederick, a partnership organization, and the SHARE Food Network, a non-profit,

community-based organization, to offer nutritious groceries at a significant discount. The network purchases groceries at bulk prices and passes those savings onto community members. As a partner, Frederick Health works with LiveWell Frederick to distribute menus, collect orders, and organize pick-ups.

"Anyone can benefit from the SHARE Food Network." says Diane Tomasky RN, BBA, CCP, Disease Management RN. "There's no application, documentation, or gualification anyone needs to meet to make a purchase."

Each order includes four to six pounds of beef, pork, chicken, or fish and eight to ten pounds of fresh fruits and vegetablesfor about 50% less than grocery store prices. When orders are

ready, residents can pick it up at Frederick Health Village.

Supporting Frederick's Care Facilities

It was clear from the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic that elderly people were among the most vulnerable to the virus, and that they and their caretakers would need additional support.

As Frederick County's primary healthcare system, Frederick Health developed a Supportive & Geriatric Care Team and, using their collective talents, secured a grant to assist the county's long-term care facilities.

This grant allowed the team to work closely with more than a dozen local facilities to provide personal protective equipment (PPE), offer telehealth services and medical assistance, and educate staff on infection reduction, N-95 mask fit testing, and more.

"Nursing home staff could call one of our nurse practitioners anytime," said Lisa Bromfield, Resource Nurse Liaison with the Supportive & Geriatric Care Team. "We could help them determine whether a hospital transfer was necessary, give medical advice, and send over nurses for consultations."

In addition, Frederick Health worked with The Maryland Patient Safety Center on their Clean Collaborative effort to ensure participating facilities were able to meet increased cleaning standards. This program helps hospitals and care facilities by measuring and tracking cells on high-touch surfaces, including viruses and bacteria, to reduce the occurrences of illness.

"It's been a wonderful experience," said Carol Ditman, Director of Nursing at Country Meadows Retirement Community. "We were able to get the support we needed, when we needed it most." Participating care facilities were able to avoid 83 hospital transfers and 29 hospital admissions during the height of the pandemic (March 23, 2020 to June 30, 2020) for a total hospital avoidance rate of 54%. Frederick Health also collaborated with facilities on more than 150 resident care concerns to determine the best plan of action.

"We are extremely grateful for this partnership," said Pam Crockett, Delegating Registered Nurse at Country Meadows. "Throughout COVID, they have been able to offer 24/7 guidance to help us meet the needs of our residents. Best of all, they share our values of person-centered care."

Finding Freedom from Smoking: Helping Frederick Live Longer, Happier, and Healthier Lives

Until 2021, Stephanie Phillips had been a smoker for more than 30 years.

She tried to break the harmful habit a handful of times, but the battle to quit was too tough to go through alone. Following her 50th birthday, she decided to get serious about her health and that included quitting smoking for good. That's when she learned about Finding Freedom from Smoking, a free smoking cessation program offered by Frederick Health.

This eight-week program is designed to help smokers quit by providing them the tools, resources, support, and accountability needed to succeed-and at no cost.

"My health has improved, and I don't cough anymore," says Stephanie. "I'm also a caregiver for my grandmother, and it's great to not need to stop

to smoke when I'm helping her. I was also able to take a trip to Hawaii and not worry about where to get cigarettes or find places where I could smoke.''

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), smoking is a leading cause of preventable disease, disability, and death. More than 16 million Americans are living with a disease caused by smoking, including cancer, heart disease, stroke, lung disease, and COPD. Smoking can harm nearly every organ in your body, and on average, non-smokers tend to live 10 years longer.

"My advice is that if you're looking to quit, make sure you have your support system in place first. I started the program before the day I quit, and they were able to give me the tools and support I needed to start off on the right foot. Let your doctor know that you are committed to quitting and get your friends and family on your side, too. When I hit my quit date, it wasn't as hard as I had expected it to be."

Led by healthcare professionals, the Finding Freedom from Smoking program covers topics including:

- Three-link chain of addictionphysical, mental, and social
- Individual smoking patterns and habits
- Coping with triggers
 and urges
- Stress management
- Relapse prevention

"To be successful, you have to do it for yourself. Now, there are more days than not that I don't think about smoking at all."
