This past year was a transformative time for Frederick Health. I'd like to update you on a few items as we close another year of working together.

As our community has continued to grow, so has our organization. I'm excited to announce the Master Plan for the Frederick Health Village was submitted to the City of Frederick. This submittal is required for our long-term vision of how the property may be developed in the future, and it will allow us the maximum flexibility to meet the healthcare needs of our growing county. This is an important, albeit early, milestone in a multi-year process. We welcome the open discussions about the future of the Village and what that location will ultimately look like as a healthcare destination.

We've continued to invest in surgical excellence and innovation. As part of that commitment to quality care, we recently unveiled our newest robotic-assisted surgery platform – the da Vinci 5. The da Vinci 5 is the most advanced, innovative surgical technology available on the market, and Frederick Health is the first and only healthcare system in the state to have one. This technology improves the patient experience by reducing pain, minimizing incisions, and offering a faster recovery. The da Vinci 5 is an incredible asset to our community, and I am proud that we are leading the way in robotic technology. Robotics is not new at Frederick Health; over the last decade, we've performed over 5,000 robotic-assisted surgeries, but we continue to grow and invest in our capabilities.

As we look towards the future, we must remember our past. I recently spoke at a plaque dedication in downtown Frederick honoring our founder, Emma Smith. The Kiwanis Club of Frederick County generously dedicated the plaque. Emma's mission was to care for the sick, comfort the injured, and provide peace of mind. She'd be proud of the growth Frederick Health has accomplished since 1902 and that we continue to positively impact the well-being of every individual in our community. The plaque is located at 18 W 3rd Street, so if you're ever downtown, stop by and see it.

As we approach another year of helping Frederick County thrive, I once again would like to extend my heartfelt appreciation for your work and effort. Your continued dedication to the Frederick Health team and this entire community is sincerely felt by those around you. On behalf of the entire Senior Leadership team, thank you.

Hard to believe that summer is gone, fall is upon us and the holiday season with all of its colors, get-togethers and excitement are fast approaching. We concluded another successful summer season with three great vendor sales. We started the hot, humid summer days with Uniform Village from Cumberland and their offerings of a wide variety of quality brands of healthcare uniforms and accessories with a two-day sale in July. We followed that sale up with a three-day sale from the popular MMG Gifts vendor and their seemingly endless variety of quality gifts and books for all occasions. We ended the summer season with a two-day sale by D&D Jewelry Designs and their line of quality jewelry, handbags and accessories.

The three summer vendor sales – Uniform Village, MMG Gifts and D&D Designs generated just over \$15,000 in sales, with almost 50% via payroll deduction and resulted in more than \$2,500 in rebates for the Auxiliary.

The upcoming Holiday Season will have three vendor sales. We kicked off the season in mid-October with a two-day sale by the popular \$7 Everything Sale presented by K&J Marketing from nearby Ellicott City. They provide a wide variety of boutique of fashion accessories, jewelry, clothing, handbags and much more. In November Mindy's Jewelry will return for a two-day sale featuring a wide variety of reasonably priced custom-made silver jewelry. We will conclude the holiday season in mid-December with a four-day sale by the much-anticipated MMG Gifts and their sale advertised as "Fabulous Finds for the Family". This is the sale that takes care of your last-minute holiday shopping at reasonable prices. All three vendor sales will take place at both the Atrium in The Village and the hospital cafeteria.


Vendor sales are very popular with the hospital staff, providing them the opportunity to purchase a wide variety of quality merchandise without venturing from the workplace, provide a source of funds for the Auxiliary ,and provide a unique opportunity for Volunteers to interact with the hospital staff. Vendor sales have payroll deduction for staff, which requires volunteers to operate the Quick Charge System, a very easy system to operate for processing the employee purchases. Volunteer shifts are 2 ½ to 3 hours each, so if you have a few spare hours, would like to lend a helping hand for fundraising, and meet some of the wonderful hospital staff members, we invite you to join the fundraising team. At the same time, you will have the first crack at the wide variety of unique quality merchandise offered for sale by our great vendors.

As always a big thank you to the dedicated volunteers of the fundraising team who operate the Quick Charge System and spread the energy and goodwill of volunteering to the hospital staff.



ReEnvisioning Critical Care Campaign

As some of you have probably noticed, there is a free-standing display, currently placed immediately before the gift shop in the main hallway. This was created by local artist Yemi Fagbobohun, in collaboration with Robin Rose, Vice-President and Chief Development Officer for Frederick Health. The display commemorates a five-year fundraising campaign that began July 1, 2019, and concluded June 30, 2024. The campaign was designated "ReEnvisioning Critical Care." The goal was to raise \$14.75 million to support the renovation and expansion of the Adult & Pediatric Emergency Department, Intensive Care Unit, and Cardiac Cath Labs. The campaign exceeded the goal raising \$14.84 million. The Auxiliary was the largest donor, pledging \$1 million toward the project. This is evident from the fact that the Auxiliary is listed at the top of the donor list. As Frederick Health's first free-standing recognition piece, Robin and Yemi have designated it as Signature Donor Recognition Piece. The door on the glass artwork is a representation of the original 1890s front door from Fredrick Hospital. Robin shared that we still have the door in the warehouse and hope someday to be able to repurpose or display it. The plan is to add the listing of Signature Donors of Frederick Health's next campaign to one side of the piece.

Gift Shop Flood

As the result of a broken water pipe in the ceiling above the register counter of the gift shop, the gift shop and other areas of the hospital were flooded in the early morning hours of Sunday, July 28, 2024. Although approximately \$6,000 in merchandise was lost and two display units were damaged, the damage to the gift shop was not as severe as initially feared. The ceiling, some light fixtures and a security camera were replaced or repaired in the gift shop. Several other areas of the hospital were also affected – cardiopulmonary, sterile processing, and the lab to name a few. Unfortunately, the gift shop was closed for approximately 60 days, reopening on September 15, 2024. 
